
Lewis, On the Plurality of Worlds

- 1. 'Why believe in a plurality of worlds?' Lewis's answer is that we should believe in a plurality of worlds because 'the price is right'. What does that mean? Is the price right? Is this cost-and-benefit approach the way scientific theories are accepted?

- 3. According to Lewis, various modal notions are 'badly served by boxes and diamonds' (p. 15). What does he mean by that? Is he right?
- 4. Pick a couple of the objections in chapter 2, and assess Lewis's replies.



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
